“For I know the plans I have for you,” declares the LORD, “plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.” (Jeremiah 29:11)

Seventeen years ago I was doing part-time work as a nurse and our youngest was entering private school with a costly tuition. With our other three children in college, I knew our income was going to need a significant boost. When I brought this to prayer, I asked the Lord to provide me with a full-time job with “flexible” hours. I told him I had no preference regarding which profession, if it afforded me flexibility to support our family life.

A week later I received a phone call from Bill Dalgetty—a friend of ours. Although he knew nothing about my intentions of finding a new job, he began explaining his vision for moving Christians in Commerce from California to Virginia. In order to make this happen he needed an Administrator for the office. When he prayed he said my name came to mind. I asked about the hours and he said they were flexible. With that answer, it

was clear the Lord was leading us both and I accepted the position.

Earlier this year I began sensing the Lord was preparing me to do something new—but no other details. As time went on, I felt he wanted me to prepare for a possible new job, so I updated my resume. I had no idea where this would lead, nor was I applying for jobs. I was just waiting upon him.

In the middle of March, Wes asked each of us to prayerfully consider how we could shape our departments to support the growth trajectory he was envisioning. When I considered the description on one of the spreadsheets of our team as “committed, passionate and knowledgeable” I hesitated. “Knowledgeable”—I didn’t feel like my skill set would be adequate for what WorkLight will need to build the future. I had clarity that it was time to bring in someone with strong financial expertise to help and for me to move on. I was at peace and was actually excited to see how the Lord was confirming our future growth! My role in our work had been fulfilled.

REFLECTIONS WEEK 1

An Act of Mercy

Stand up and praise the Lord your God, who is from everlasting to everlasting. (Nehemiah 9:5)

Due to health reasons, I have been in and out of jobs—not holding one for longer than two years—since high school. Pain in my hands led me to leave my first job, and Lyme disease caused me to leave my second one. I worked hard yet slowly to get back into the workforce, moving from work that was several hours a week to working full time.

Along the way, I have learned that any job and circumstance can be used for and by the Lord. When I started working as a customer service representative, I felt overqualified. This attitude affected my work. I became annoyed when the phone rang, and I found myself not wanting to go to work.

Then I became a health coach. Calling people to ask them to take a health survey provided an opportunity to have lots of conversations, and some people shared heart-wrenching stories. I didn't know what to say. I wanted to be able to comfort them and offer them hope, but they were talking about really difficult things.

Around this time, I began training with the Christian nonprofit Stephen Ministries. A Stephen Minister's main job is to be a compassionate listener as you walk with others who are struggling with grief and hardships. One of the main focuses is learning to listen well.

I started applying this skill to my work as a health coach. Gradually, I realized the Lord had given me an opportunity to encounter him in the people I talk to every day. I started to recognize skills and gifts the Lord had given me that I didn't know I had—such as being a good listener. For those who are hurting, sometimes just having a good listener can help to lift the weight of their burdens.

I started to pray between phone conversations and invited the Lord into those conversations, praying: *Come, Holy Spirit, give me the words to say to this person.* I also started to intentionally smile whenever I answered the phone to help keep me in an attitude of humbly serving others.

I realized that this job was an act of the Lord's great mercy to me. It's an incredibly supportive environment with good coworkers and a boss who does a great job of showing appreciation. This environment has enabled me to work despite my health challenges. It's also taught me the type of coworker I want to be and has encouraged me to be more intentional in showing gratitude to others.

Waiting for Patience

Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. (Ephesians 4:2)

I thought I was a patient person. For years I worked with many young children and their parents and understood patience as a necessary virtue to be good at what I did. Eventually, I remarried and started a business with my husband. Come to find out, I am not as patient as I thought I was.

It seemed like I was always waiting—to go somewhere together, for clients to show up, or driving long distances to find a client had forgotten the appointment or was no longer interested.

Raised to not keep others waiting, I struggled to be patient with others who didn't see time and punctuality as basic considerations.

Searching for a way to deal with my continual frustration over waiting for others, I decided to let the Lord handle it. I gave it to him and let it go. If we were late for something and it worked out wonderfully, that was great. And if we were late for something and we missed something, it no longer reflected on me. My husband and I have come to be more of one mind because I am more often able to let go of a time situation. Now, I just ask the Lord to handle it in the way he sees best.

Recently, I found myself waiting for someone, again. I started to think about how patient the Lord has been with me. As I stood in the kitchen, I could say to the Lord, "Lord, you have been so patient with me. Thank you. I can be patient, with Your help. Amen."

I asked Collette's algebra teacher if I could teach her early math skills during her algebra lab. He agreed and created a curriculum for us. I taught her to create and read large numbers, to round numbers, to use negative numbers and decimals, order of operations, variables, etc. All new concepts were introduced using 3D materials and linking them to real life experiences.

Initially, Collette was petrified of fractions. Yet after working together, she got a perfect score on her test and her teacher began calling her his "fraction genius." At the end of the semester she had mastered every concept leading up to algebra, scoring an 87 on the final exam!

When I retired, the Lord told me that he wanted me to help people whom he loved and who needed his help. It was the Lord who inspired me to create new materials and approaches for Collette. I was so touched by how much love the Lord had for her. He put me and others in the right place at the

This would explain why math was so difficult for her: Everything in math is visual-spatial. I discovered that there's a paucity of material on NVLDs. However, the Lord helped me find one article that explained the approach she needed.

Accepting the Challenge

He will cover you with his feathers and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness will be your shield and rampart. (Psalm 91:4)

We sit side by side at our dining room table with a computer screen and a bunch of forms. Will has called the clients who sent a request for information and set up a time for us to talk by phone. He handles the hard part of our business and he is persistent but kind when he finally reaches the person. Then he introduces us and tells the client why we are calling. They had bought a house or refinanced and returned a form letter requesting information on life insurance for people with mortgages.

In the years we have worked together, we have had many fun adventures

and met many wonderful people. We can drive by a house in a little town and just smile because we remember the wonderful client that lives there. In all of this, I recognize that we do this because we enjoy working together and because the Lord has been clear: He wants us selling life insurance together.

I have always dreaded the beginning of each life appointment with a stranger, whether it's in the client's home or over the phone. I learned early on to say, "Not my will, Lord, but your will be done," and I repeat it three times. Then I take the phone from Will and introduce myself. I continue the interview and by the end realize I generally enjoy these appointments.

There's much that I have not enjoyed about this business—it's too hard for me, I'm not emotionally resilient enough, and I'm not a salesperson. And yet, despite that, the Lord has been clear with us: bring hope to people in your appointments. Don't worry about results; I will take care of those. You focus on bringing hope,

whether it's through friendship, service, a smile, or a homemade granola bar.

The Lord has been faithful. He told me once, "just because something is hard doesn't mean it isn't good." We are grateful for the growth, the adventures and the friendships we have gained through our work.

Thank you, Lord, for this job, which has helped us develop a deeper trust of you and each other.

Talk about the hard parts of your job and about how they have helped you grow in deeper trust of the Lord or your fellow workers.

Operating in the Fruit of the Spirit

The Spirit of the Lord shall rest on him—the Spirit of wisdom and of understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and of fear of the Lord—his delight is the fear of the Lord.” (Isaiah 11:2)

We Respond

“If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies because of his Spirit who lives in you.” (Romans 8:11)

Work is God’s great gift to us. It’s a call to work for our Father, 24/7, 365 days a year, especially where we spend 60 percent of our waking hours—our workplace. Our jobs matter. It’s where we make ourselves useful. They are key to our stewardship of his creation. It’s where we work together to enable all to live the life and make the contributions he intends.

Habits of the Kingdom Worker

Christians should exhibit the characteristics of the best workers in the world:

- Loving where others hate
- Joy-filled during challenges
- Keeping cool in conflicts and bringing about reconciliation
- Persevering through difficulties
- Being a person of integrity and honesty
- Kind to all no matter their function or status
- Big-hearted in all situations and willing to help out
- Calm, never forceful

- Always in control of their passions

Do you recognize these characteristics? They are called the fruit of the Spirit.

“The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.” (Galatians 5:22-23)

Good intentions, personal talents, and hard work alone will not make these characteristics a reality. Only the indwelling of the Holy Spirit makes this possible. Our Father wants us to receive the Holy Spirit, wants the Spirit to be present in us, and his power to be released in our lives.

“If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.” (Romans 8:11)

Life in the Spirit and the fruit that results allow us to radiate Christ and make him visible, admirable, and attractive. Wouldn’t we like to work with people like this? Your supervisor has had great success in these areas. Now he expects you to do “greater things” than he did. But then he sends you out on your own. No help, backup, tools, or support. What sense does that make?

“Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God.” John 1:12

The Holy Spirit wants to invest in us and help us be fruitful. No matter who we are, we can and should have the Holy Spirit pour out from us to others.

Acquiring the Holy Spirit, his gifts and his power, are not for our own benefit, but to equip us in working for our Father, 24/7, 365 days a year. Are we willing to serve our Father humbly and with devotion?

LOVE: love, which centers in moral preference, benevolence, good will, esteem, typically refers to divine love. The ability to accept others; to give ourselves in service to others without expecting anything in return. (John 3.16, 13.34-35)

Are you being influenced by the Spirit in reaching out to others in a loving manner? Do you treat your family and those around you with love?

- ▶ 1 2 3 4 5

JOY: Joy, gladness, calm delight. A deep, inner gladness that comes from your relationship with Jesus Christ. (Rom 14.17-18, 15.13)

Is the Holy Spirit producing joy in your heart that overflows into your everyday life? Do you choose joy over worry?

- ▶ 1 2 3 4 5

PEACE: peace, peace of mind, in the Hebraistic sense of the health (welfare) of an individual. An inner harmony and sense of wellbeing

based on our faith that God is in control no matter what happens. (Jn 16.33, Phil 4.4-7)

Is your life full of peace in spite of your circumstances? Are you trusting God and not fearful about what may happen in the future?

- ▶ 1 2 3 4 5

PATIENCE: patience, forbearance, longsuffering. The ability to show restraint and calm in waiting on God, despite circumstances that may cause us to get angry. (Col 3.12-13)

Do you accept interruptions and delays with grace and peace? Do you surrender to God when things don't go your way?

- ▶ 1 2 3 4 5

KINDNESS: morally excellent (in character or demeanor) goodness, uprightness, kindness, gentleness. The ability to treat others with openness, sensitivity, and love, and to share the kindness that comes from God. (Rom 2.4, 11.22)

Is your first inclination to meet the needs of others, to be kind and avoid harshness? Do you have sensitivity to others and a willingness to put their needs ahead of yours?

- ▶ 1 2 3 4 5

GOODNESS: intrinsic goodness, especially as a personal quality, with stress on the kindly (rather than the righteous) i.e. virtue or beneficence goodness. Having the nature of God, able to tell right from wrong, doing good to others and avoiding evil. (2 Thes 1.11)

Are your thoughts, words and behavior of a high moral standard?

- ▶ 1 2 3 4 5

FAITHFULNESS: moral conviction (of religious truth, or the truthfulness of God or a religious teacher), especially reliance upon Christ for salvation, faith, belief, trust, confidence; fidelity. Unshakable loyalty shows in being trustworthy, reliable, responsible and carrying out our commitments to God and others. (Acts 6.8)

Are you a person of your word? Do you follow through on what you start? Can others count on you? Are you faithful in your commitments?

- ▶ 1 2 3 4 5

GENTLENESS: mildness, gentleness, meekness. Showing consideration and thoughtfulness, putting my rights and

strength under God's control in order to seek peace. It requires openness, humility, a teachable spirit. (1 Cor 4.21)

Are you quick to listen and slow to act and speak? Are you healthily assertive yet non-aggressive in your relationships?

- ▶ 1 2 3 4 5

SELF-CONTROL: self-mastery, self-restraint, temperance. The virtue of one who masters his desires and passions, especially his sensual appetites. (Acts 24:25; 2 Peter 1:6)

Do you exercise restraint when tempted? Do you exercise discipline in your life?
