# Finding Peace in Conflict

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." (John 14:27)

A litigation attorney is not a career in which the idea of being a peacemaker usually comes up. In fact, many would think that this adversarial career would be the opposite of bringing peace. I thought that for many years but changed my view when a client taught me a lesson I never forgot.

I had been hired to help a family in a tragic injury and death case. The father had been killed and the daughter seriously injured in an accident out of state. I spent almost two years working on the case and met

with the daughter and son many times to go over a variety of complex issues that came up during this time. At the end of this case, some family members were invited to speak at a Christian gathering to explain how God had been with them through this difficult time in their lives.

I sat in the back during the meeting and listened as they explained what they had gone through. At one point they mentioned all the stress and conflict when insurance companies, bill collectors, and legal matters were overwhelming them. It was then that they mentioned that their attorney came and brought them peace. I had never thought of myself as a peacemaker but suddenly I saw something different.

When people are overwhelmed with the world they seek peace and comfort from someone who can help them. I started to see my job in a whole new way. Being a peacemaker was not just one who settles conflict but rather can be one who brings comfort and peace to those in conflict. John E. How are we to respond to earthly tragedy? I used to think my job was to get the download on Sundays and try to fix everything myself during the

week. I would reassure the widow that she was still loved. Encourage someone facing a serious illness to believe in the power of healing and modern medicine. Try to get a victim of divorce to see the possibilities of a new life.

But where's the real peacemaking opportunity? Earthly problems can't be solved by earthly means. After all, we aren't entirely part of this world. We are children of God most high. Only spiritual solutions can truly set us free from earthly bondage. In Christ we find authentic peace, not just another strategy to fix something. Jesus is the path from anxiety to peace. And he can conquer anything for anyone. Anytime. Anywhere.

The heartbroken widow is still loved. The source of that love is far greater than any person can express. The terminally ill can have hope not only for miraculous healing but for deliverance from fear and bondage. The greatest new relationship for anyone, perhaps especially a broken divorcee, comes in a renewed relationship with Jesus.

If you have ears to hear, you just might be turning to God in thanksgiving right now. Especially in the face of death, fear, and loss. Where in your life is the Holy Spirit equipping you to bring the peacemaking of our Lord and Savior into the anxiety of this world?

### Into the Conflict

If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. (Romans 12:18)

The phone was ringing off the hook as I ran to answer it. When I heard the voice on the other end, my heart fell, and I realized I was in for a long, gut-wrenching conversation. "I am so upset. I do not know how much more of this I can take. I should have left him years ago," said the voice on the other end.

Over the past 30 years I have been the "go to person" for my beloved friend who continues to foster her feelings of depression, anxiety, and misgivings in her relationship with her husband.

In the beginning, I tried to counsel her and make suggestions as to how she could remedy this conflicting relationship. But after years of such conversations and diligent prayer, nothing has really changed. And in addition, her husband is also a good friend so these conflicts are very challenging for me.

In reflecting on this conflicted triangle of individuals, I must ask myself this question: "Lord, what am I to learn from this situation and why aren't my efforts helping?"

The answer lies in Paul's words in Romans 12:18. In a world where we've been disciplined to avoid conflict, peacemaking takes a commitment to move toward it. The peacemaker knows there is no peace without healing, and there is no healing without tough conversations and work.

The pursuit of meaningful relationships is essential to peacemaking. Peacemaking may be kind, but it is not passive. It demands that we step into conflict regardless of the outcome. It is an opportunity to let them experience God's love and mercy first hand.

### **Making Peace**

"Therefore, if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there in front of the altar. First go and be reconciled to them; then come and offer your gift." (Matthew 5:23 -24)

When Jesus proclaimed the Beatitude "Blessed are the peacemakers," he followed up with their reward: "they shall be called children of God." Given the value of the reward, it would have been nice if he told us how to make peace!

How does one make peace? How much lumber do you need? Are there blueprints?

Jesus provided a clue later in his sermon, and I quote it above. One way to make peace is to seek forgiveness. Forgiving is important, too, but this scripture is clear: If your brother has something against you, it means you are the transgressor, not he. You are the one who needs forgiveness, so you are the one who must seek it.

Asking for forgiveness is hard. In comparison, forgiving is much easier. The one who was injured holds the power to forgive or to withhold forgiveness. He is in control. The one who needs forgiving lacks that power. He can neither force forgiveness nor demand mercy. Needing forgiveness makes one a beggar and no one wants to beg, so forgiveness can't occur and peace cannot be made.

Contrition requires humility. Only a humble heart can sincerely seek forgiveness (Psalms 53:17). Those who seek forgiveness make peace, and shall be called children of God.

A hot-tempered person stirs up conflict, but the one who is patient calms a quarrel. (Proverbs 15:18)

I have worked for our Father for over 50 years in a courtroom where opposing views are commonly presented to a jury or judge for an equitable decision or resolution. Based on this half century of experience in this workplace, I recognize and appreciate a "peacemaker" when I see one.

My WorkLight men's chapter in Duluth, Minnesota, has been blessed by such a "child of God." His name is Phil. Whenever he shares his life experiences and insights during our weekly discussions, Phil reveals that he is the "peacemaker" Jesus has called each of us to be in his Sermon on the Mount.

Our brother, Phil, works five days a week as a custodian in an office building and a pub. At each of these workplaces he meets and greets office tenants, bar customers, and others, who clearly live alternative lifestyles and espouse beliefs and opinions different from—even opposed to—Phil's biblical values. He greets and meets everyone with cheerfulness, patience, calm, and mercy. And it is obvious that everyone Phil has come to know in these workplaces truly appreciates, and loves Phil.

Recently, Phil received a birthday card signed by most, if not all, of the office building tenants. Comments such as "love you," "thanks for always being here," and the like abounded throughout the card. Others actually recognize and are grateful for the love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, and gentleness (Galatians 5:22) of peacemakers in their midst. The fruits of the Spirit impact fellow believers, like us WorkLight members on Tuesday mornings, but his peacemaking is equally visible and attractive to nonbelievers in Phil's workplaces.

Jack Borja first became involved in WorkLight in the 1980s. His experience with the power of the Holy Spirit has been life changing. It has been enriched and reinforced and has grown ever since his first Challenge Weekend.

Since then, he's felt called to continue to shine Christ's light and bring the Lord to more people. "Once you've been baptized in the Holy Spirit, you always know the Lord is in your heart," he says.

He loves to introduce friends and acquaintances to the Lord by giving them an annual Bible Diary\* of daily liturgical readings. "I've been distributing it for 20 years. I use it as my business card," he says.

Jack's business mentee, Michele Wang, goes through it every day, "reading and taking notes and reflecting," she says, "When I have questions about the Scripture passage, I'll just ask him about it."

Recently, several recipients of the Bible Diary joined Jack for WorkLight's National Challenge Weekend in Arizona. During the weekend, everyone was prayed over for the Holy Spirit. "I can give a Bible Diary to a new believer, they'll read it and try to make sense of it, but when you're baptized in the Holy Spirit, everything changes," he says.

The group bonded during the retreat over shared meals and plenty of time praying together—including praying before and after the conference each day. Now, the group meets regularly through a combination of in-person and Zoom, so everyone can participate. During each twice-a-month meeting, a different member gives a talk based

on a WorkLight Reflection before everyone breaks out into small groups for discussions.

Through this, members are learning how to give testimonies—a skill that can hopefully result in creative evangelization opportunities. "The more people are given the chance to give a talk, the more confident they are to talk about the Lord," Jack says. "It's like home-based training. You almost have to go through the experience of giving a presentation.

"I believe that each and every one the Lord has touched will need to do a presentation in the world on how to deliver the Gospel message in a concise, "elevator-ride," way."

Little did Jack know when he began, that the people he was sending Bible Diaries to would be filled with the power of the Holy Spirit and begin learning to evangelize.

"For the past 5 to 10 years, I have been thinking 'how do I bring people to a deeper relationship with the Lord?" Then I realized, I need to bring them into the life of the Holy Spirit, that's what happened to me. The Challenge Weekend is a seminar on life in the Spirit, which is what I invited them to. Now we're bonded and see each other twice a month and share the Lord together."

me to talk to her and apologize. As Dale Carnegie observed, the hardest thing for anyone to say is "I was wrong." I would add "especially on days when you narrowly avoided death and you're anxious to leave and visit your recovering wife in the ER." With quivering legs, I knocked on Edith's office door.

In the ensuing conversation, I listened and learned about her underlying fear of ice and snow and about her experience of men dismissing her justified concerns. I validated her distress and expressed my commitment to address them, shared about my morning, apologized for my tone, and requested her forgiveness.

I wish I could say things were better after that, but in the coming months, Edith seemed to make it her ambition to ensure I was fired. Casual coworking conversations with her frequently resulted in my boss and HR receiving "anonymous" critical and slanderous feedback about my performance. Life was tense.

Throughout the next year, I learned the value of restoration. It meant admitting I can't change others' behavior, only my own. It meant choosing forgiveness "70x7" times (Matthew 18:21:22). It took months of consistently showing love, concern, and genuine remorse for any small missteps before I started to see the relationship restored. In the end, on Edith's last day before retirement, she looked me in the eyes and told me she "trusted" me. I knew then that despite the events of that awful day, we had finally restored our relationship and found peace.

We may not be trained theologians or master apologists for our Christian faith, but we have stories to tell and they have a unique power for our materialistic society. Stories illustrate the life of Christ in a fractured, fallen, and rebellious world. They are able to reach hearts in ways not possible through pure reason and logic.

In a recent interview, author Os Guinness noted, "We need a massive awakening right across Western civilization. We need the Word and the Spirit to break us and help us understand there is a far greater reality than a consumer society allows us to know."

Stories of Christ at work spark imaginations, letting the transcendency of God breakthrough. Their details impress listeners in contexts they recognize and can apply to themselves. In an age of cynicism and hostility to Christianity, these accounts speak a language that breaks open the hardened shell and touches the soul.

Using a new language perfect for a post-Christian world, well-told testimonies of God at work draw the secularized mind in. It unveils God's mercy, love, and consolation with a gentle invitation. Our modern Western culture has been described as a "world without windows." Our stories illustrate the transcendence of God in a way that lights up the darkness of a windowless world.

Being able to tell a good story of Christ working impacts both the storyteller and the listener. The crafting of a personal story helps the storyteller reflect on God's work in their lives, appreciating his steadfast love and growing in gratitude. For the listener, what they hear is a story of love, undermining the world's narrative of a harsh, demanding, and distant God.

Love isn't something that can be scientifically measured. It's qualitative not quantitative and it's personal. To understand how God loves requires a story of his love in action. Christian storytelling is best based on everyday circumstances. It is where most people live. Our story says, "Come and see."

These "Christ alive" stories illustrate our own faithfulness, love, and devotion to God in particular, authentic, and attractive ways. Well-crafted stories take time and effort. But when we're done, each of us has a gem in our pocket that can be offered to others when the Spirit moves.


