When I think about the power of prayer at work, I've always assumed it needed to have a happy ending in order for it to be a useful and effective story.

for it to be a useful and effective story. But prayers aren't always answered, or at least not right away. Prayers are meant to draw us closer to God, our Abba Father, our most important relationship.

There is power in simply maintaining that relationship because even though God might not be doing what we want, he does have an opportunity to do what "he" wants. Sometimes it takes him longer to do what he wants though—or at least it seems that way.

About a year ago, a very close friend of mine was let go from his job as a VP for an expanding insurance technology company. It was a big surprise and shook him deeply. I met with him and encouraged him that God wasn't surprised! It could actually be a good thing as this would give him an opportunity to do what he really wanted to do and to draw closer to God in the process.

A year passed and we met again for lunch. He told me he'd had a lot of

great interviews and met a lot of great people. But he was so frustrated and confused. He had been a finalist with one other person 10 times and had not received the offer. Ten times! He couldn't believe it. Frankly neither could I.

What was God doing? What was my friend supposed to be learning from all this? There had to be a reason, right? My friend told me he just wanted clarity. I paused and quickly grabbed my phone to look up a devotional in my *Glorify* app that talked about someone who was seeking clarity and even asked Mother Teresa to pray for him. She said "no" she would not do that. When he asked her why, she said, "Clarity is the last thing you are clinging to and must let go of." When he responded that she always seemed to have clarity, she laughed and said: "I have never had clarity; what I've always had is trust. So, I will pray that you trust God."

As I shared the devotional with my friend, I also encouraged him to

Listen

My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak ... (James 1:19)

Working in patient services for a medical hub, I encounter many people throughout my day, and a variety of different situations. It's choosing to do the work with and for the Lord that has helped me the most with this job, enabling me to be better poised to serve people personally. "Come, Holy Spirit" is my favorite prayer, and I say it before answering each phone call.

One day, a woman called in and casually shared she had recently been the victim of horrific violence. Shocked and sobered, I asked the Lord for guidance for the call. "Listen," he said.

I heard one of the saddest stories I have ever encountered, of a lifetime of

hardship and violence. As I listened, I would gently respond with "Wow, God bless you." But she didn't respond to those words, and I didn't offer to pray. As I continued to listen, I was struck by how, amidst the violence and suffering, the Lord was clearly loving her through some people in her life, had preserved her beautiful heart, and given her a strong grace of strength and lightness.

At the end of the conversation, once I had done all I could for her, she stopped and thanked me for listening. "Not many people would have listened to my story," she said. "Most people hear a little and don't want to deal with me."

I told her that I had been truly honored to meet her and praised her for the strengths I had seen in her. She then shared that she had been baptized just a few days before and was starting a new chapter with the Lord! It was then that I offered to pray with her.

Following our conversation, I sat and cried silently at my desk for several minutes, weeping over the depth of tragedy. God knows what everyone has been through and what they need. We just need to ask him for guidance and insight, and act and respond accordingly.

Standing in the Gap

I looked for someone among them who would build up the wall and stand before me in the gap on behalf of the land so I would not have to destroy it, but I found no one." (Ezekiel 22:30)

One Friday night when we were on our way home, we pulled up behind a truck that was stalled in the intersection. As I approached the vehicle, I offered to help, but our attempts to start the truck failed.

There was no way I could move this truck by myself. I silently asked God for some help. I didn't know that the owner of the truck, Athena, was doing the same thing. At that very moment two men jumped out of their car and asked if they could help. Athena said, For many months I prayed, "Lord, please help me to see your will in this challenging situation." The answer became abundantly clear: "Let your suffering in this situation bear witness to and reflect Christ's love for us." In other words, I was to unite my pain and suffering to the Lord's rather than simply run away from a difficult work situation.

This is easier said than done, and I often found myself in quiet moments praying the verse from Philippians 4:13: "I can do all this through him who gives me strength." This steady reminder of the Lord's presence helped bring a sense of peace and serenity about how this important chapter of my work life would draw to a close. Ultimately, this meant leaving the company and many friends whom I dearly loved and respected, which I accomplished through God's grace.

When we establish faith in God as our first priority and seek to know and understand his will in our daily lives, the blessings of his mercy and grace are spilled out upon us abundantly.

I often end up standing in a gap for people, as Ezekiel beckons, by providing intercessory prayer to approach God with confidence on someone else's behalf. Admittedly, I haven't always been the best at this. When folks disclose a special need, I say, "I will keep you in my prayers." Was it merely a kind gesture without support?

Through prayer and petition, we can all become more sensitive to those he asks us to intercede for. Ask yourself: "Who have I promised to pray for recently? Was I faithful to their request or was it merely a kind gesture?"

Standing in the gap for family and friends, strangers, religious leaders, political leaders, our country, and the world is critical. Intercessory prayer is a gift that teaches persistence, determination, patience, faith, selfdiscipline, and selflessness. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. (Matthew 28:19-20)

I was working in New York City as a company manager for an off-Broadway show when I learned my grandfather died. Standing outside the box office, tears broke free as I handed out paychecks. There on West 4th Street, my wall of professionalism crumbled.

The cast was kind in their responses to my situation: "you're in my thoughts" and "good vibes" and a new phrase, "sending you good ju-ju." As I considered that new-to-me word, one unlikely actor said, "I'm praying for you." I looked up and saw a glimmer in his eyes. "Thank you," I said. "You have no idea what it means to hear that right now."

"I had an idea it was your language too," he winked.

Until then, I was careful about my faith expression, choosing to be respectful and even toned in my dialogue outside my family and faith community. Jesus, scripture, and "holy talk" made people uncomfortable. But that day in Greenwich Village, as taxis zoomed by and stilettos clicked across the pavement, I committed to discarding the facade.

Our words are mighty. When we say, "I'm praying for you," we're essentially saying, "I am invested in your welfare, not only in the context of our shared workspace but on a profound spiritual level." Just the simple act of choosing prayer over secular expressions has the potential to foster a more compassionate and even unexpectedly cohesive workplace.

Further, the words we choose when a coworker faces difficulty is a testament to how seriously we take Christ's final instructions to his disciples before his ascension. It goes beyond fleeting sentiments and taps into the wellspring of compassion that is sharing one's faith. Consider the alternative. Imagine holding back your true intentions and playing along with what is socially acceptable. What is more generous in the long run? Which path expands the Kingdom?

whatever we ask for in prayer, then why can't I ask and receive solutions to everything I don't like right now?



I run a Christian retirement community providing living opportunities from independent through end-of-life care. For years, I had been praying about the problem of childcare for my staff. I was open to building on our campus to include childcare but couldn't find a partner that aligned with our mission, vision, and values.

The Lord unexpectedly offered me a solution when a church decided to close their Early Learning Center (ELC) after 13 years. It was a high quality, four-star accredited preschool with a waitlist. I approached them immediately and we created an agreement for us to take over the school in a new facility on our campus as an intergenerational preschool.

The church embraced us with extreme generosity and faith, delaying their plans and sacrificing their space in order to house the school for two more years so we could finish building. It was risky for them to trust us, but we both had listened to God and obeyed.

But this gift to me was a source of strong emotions for others. There was public outcry over the closing, and anger over how it was handled. People called the news with outrage. Media coverage ran of disgruntled teachers and families.

Two years later, as we prepared to celebrate the opening, I held a press

conference with families, donors, the head of school, and the church leadership. I knew inviting the church leadership to speak and pray over the school would be very difficult for some, and had the potential for conflict, creating strained dynamics in a public forum. But I believed it was inspired by the Holy Spirit, and that God wanted to do something powerful.

What ensued was an unexpected series of people witnessing the abundant way in which the Lord had worked.

Thirty minutes before the conference, a school leader apologized to the ELC leadership for how she had handled herself during the initial hurt and anger over the closing. She said she had come to see that God had worked miraculously, taking the ministry to a new level never imagined.

With cameras set, a previously outspoken parent who had given the leader a very difficult time was present to give a testimonial about the school. But, when the cameras rolled, he instead gave a testimony on how he personally worked through his initial disappointment and anger and realized that the new school was more than he hoped or imagined.

In response to my prayers, the Lord provided my community an intergenerational school enhancing the lives of residents and families. It is an answer to the ELC's prayers for the ministry to continue, and for courage to follow God's new direction. This faith journey transformed us all as we witnessed the power, faithfulness, and generosity of our God.
