# December 2023



Everything seemed complicated and overwhelming. This was unfamiliar territory with a lot at stake. It was April of 2022 and we had received confusing phone calls from Carolyn's younger sister who was in the hospital. Judy was single and living alone in the family home. We would have to travel 1,200 miles to North Carolina to figure out what to do.

From the beginning, the Lord made clear my focus for going forward. I was to walk alongside Carolyn and these would be her decisions to make. My background and personality makes it natural for me to figure things out and make decisions. He wanted my approach to be different. I was there to show his love to Carolyn and her family and put them first. But how? There was so much to figure out. Where was the balance? I would soon find out.

Medical care in small towns and rural North Carolina is very different from urban areas and Judy needed multiple specialties and healthcare providers. Carolyn had authority to manage Judy's health care, but the information was disconnected, conflicting, and confusing.

During that first week a breakthrough occurred. It would radically transform the way we let the Lord guide us going forward and take each step into evolving uncertainty.

Judy had returned home. We made dozens of phone calls with no progress. In the middle of the week, she began to take on fluid again. We drove her to the closest hospital that was 30 minutes away. Dozens of people filled the waiting room and it would be half a day before they could get to her. We chose to return home and decide in the morning.

I woke up early to pray. The image that came to mind was of a tangled bundle of threads. I said, "Lord, just show me which thread to pull on." Within a half hour, I got a return phone call from Duke Liver Center in Raleigh, one of three healthcare facilities we had been trying to contact.

I expressed frustration about reconciling multiple specialists and getting her the right care. The person on the phone said, "Well, you can admit her to the emergency room at

Romans 12:2 has been very meaningful to me in this effort to conform my mind to his desires and then choosing his will over mine. And Philippians 4:8 has also been extremely helpful: "...whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things." What is his "good, pleasing and perfect will" for me? What course of action is most "noble, right, pure, lovely, admirable and praiseworthy?"

I accept that doing God's will requires humility and surrender. During my daily morning prayer time with our living God, I specifically surrender myself and my dear ones to him, knowing that by surrendering all to him, my Lord Jesus will take care of everything. I am recognizing that God's will includes the dreaded "R" word in the near future.

Recently, my career journey led me to a position in vocational education at a trade school. My primary responsibilities consisted of recruiting potential students and explaining the different areas of training in hands-on technical skills.

Much to my dismay, I learned the job involved enrolling as many students as possible through emotional manipulation. I rebelled against the industry culture by treating all potential students with integrity, understanding, and grace. My goal was to empower students to achieve success from our programs and to improve their lives.

Eventually, business slowed down and my supervisors began to question my performance. Management provided less guidance, and I was feeling lost. Despite these developments, I reached out to friends and colleagues experienced in this field and explored many online resources for support. But most importantly, I looked to the Lord for wisdom and guidance: "If this is not where you want me to be God, give me a sign!"

A few weeks later, I was let go without any warning or explanation. Taking away the opportunities to change lives was more heartbreaking than my termination! Having the opportunity to see students succeed and create incredible careers showed me that God's will is more powerful than our own will. "Why did God want to take this away from me?" I thought to myself. With diligent prayer, God showed me that the constant pressure to "sell more" violated my personal values and desires to help students find their pathways to success.

This unexpected outcome gave me the opportunity to reflect on my own priorities and personal relationship and faith in the Lord. I was trying to do it alone according to my own will. As I prayed and reflected, I understood that God was giving me what I needed rather than what I wanted.



Duke Raleigh and all those are available in one place." While Raleigh was an hour and half away, it suddenly became clear it was the thread.

After seven days in Raleigh, we had a much clearer idea of what we needed to know and the next short-term steps for us to take. Going forward, it would be a crooked road and Judy would have other complications that would affect her physical and mental health.

The situation is still complicated with many uncertainties. We know that while we have to take everything step-by-step, it is the Lord who lives outside of time and space and who can guide us through. In each moment, we can only ask him, "What is it you want us to know and what is it you want us to do?" He has faithfully and consistently shown us the thread we are to pull each time.

It has been a transformative experience that while hard and uncertain, has deepened Carolyn and my love for each other, our shared trust in God's faithfulness, and a real sense of caring for one another's interests.

Steve Becker and his wife Carolyn continue to live another "full" life in Burnsville, Minnesota, with four adult children, six grandchildren and their families living close by.



My life has been a series of letting go and trusting God. I've experienced situations both personally and professionally throughout my lifetime that were inconceivable in my youth.

I used my likes and dislikes as guidelines for my decision-making process, and always strived for perfection. These were also the conditions I put before the Lord, not realizing that God had bigger plans for me.

I have always loved God, so I thought perfection was the only option for me and applied the Lord's expectations according to my own criteria: No teaching, no working with children, and no sending me overseas. But I soon discovered that God's plans for me would not fit my blueprint.

I started my nursing career in a hospital setting but found that working with adults made me want to quit. It wasn't long before God moved me into working

with children, which changed my perception from dread to joy. My work in a pediatric trauma ICU evolved my nursing skills and my character, from technical nursing to crisis care.

Ten years later I found myself in Khartoum, Sudan. This came unexpectedly after completing my nursing degree and serving as a clinical trainer. Half of my career was serving as a nurse for children and the other half was teaching, training, and consultation. The Lord had changed my heart so that I learned how to say "yes" to him even when I had once told him "never."

In Sudan my experiences enabled me to deeply understand a unique richness among those who lived in poverty, sickness, and with little means to survive. Although I trained medics and tried to fill in their training gaps, they taught me much more in ways that were non-traditional and very different. It was

humbling and grew my understanding of how God loves all souls.

Coming home, I took a job in the ICU at the University of Minnesota hospital, due to my previous connections with a local leadership training consortium. But my heart had changed, and I knew where I needed to be. My new calling was public and community health nursing doing health prevention and advocating for those with diverse experiences.

After six years at the U of M, I found the job that moved me into public health nursing where I've stayed and grown—both professionally and spiritually. A part of that transition was a consulting job in a national nonprofit organization that afforded opportunities to build national partnerships and relationships. And from there I went into state service where I honed my knowledge and empathetic skills.

During the 25 years of working in community health I learned to make decisions from an intellectual viewpoint while combining its application to address the concerns and needs in our community.

In looking back at my life and my goals, I learned that grace is always present and through cooperating with God's grace, I grew into a new comfort zone with him. When I take on what he has given me and dwell in his grace, my life becomes a joy rather than a burden, even when it is far beyond the plans I had for myself.
